

# Language Course Visa

# **General information:**

All residents of the United States who wish to do a language course in Germany must obtain a residence permit in the form of a visa. Please note that a visa can only be granted for a so called "intensive language course" of at least 18 hours a week.

Once all required documents have been submitted, the application and supporting documents will be forwarded to the competent Aliens Authority (*Ausländerbehörde*) at the applicant's intended place of residence during his/her stay in Germany. The processing can take up to 12 weeks. As soon as the application has been approved by the German authority, the Embassy/Consulate will issue a national visa for the first 6 months of the intended stay. A final residence permit for the whole duration of the language course will be issued upon arrival in Germany by the Aliens' Authority.

Although the visa is called a "national visa", please note that it does also entitle its holder to enter other Schengen countries for a stay of up to 90 days for tourism purposes.

## Required documents:

Please make sure to prepare **two complete sets of the following documents** collated in the order listed below and bring them to your appointment. Incomplete documentation may result in the rejection of your application.

Valid passport – issued within the past 10 years, providing a minimum of 2 blank
pages.
Application form – duly and fully completed
Declaration of accurancy of information
<b>Passport sized photos</b> – no older than three months, must meet biometric standards
Copies of the passport's data page
Residence permit in the U.S., e.g. Visa, Green Card, US passport
Proof of address, e.g. valid driver's license, utility bill, lease
Letter of acceptance/enrollment from a language school – must indicate the level (A1,
B2,) and length of the course and weekly course hours.
Motivation letter and school certificates/university degree
Proof of housing in Germany incl. full address (e.g. rental agreement, hotel
reservation or invitation letter in case of private accommodation with name, full address
and passport copy of the inviting person)
Proof of sufficient funds to cover the costs of your stay:
- proof of scholarship for studies in Germany OR
- blocked account: When applying for visa, you can provide evidence that you are able
to meet your living costs by opening a blocked bank account. You have free choice of
provider. Information on providers that offer this service worldwide is available on the
Federal Foreign Office website. OR
- formal obligation ("Verpflichtungserklärung")
If applicant is under the age of 18:
<ul> <li>birth certificate with parental information, original and official translation into</li> </ul>



German or English, if applicable (must be certified by a notary public if parent is not present at the interview) – plus one copy

- consent letter signed by both parents (signature must be certified by a notary public if parent is not present at the interview)
- application form signed by at least one parent
- passport copies of both parents

Proof of **travel health insurance** for the first 90 days of your stay with a minimum coverage of 30.000 EUR (see <a href="here">here</a> for detailed requirements).

The German missions in the US reserve the right to ask for **additional documents** at any time during the processing of your application whenever deemed appropriate. Presenting the aforementioned documents does not guarantee that a visa will be granted.

### Fees:

The visa fee amounts to 75 EUR (for applicants under the age of 18: 37.50 EUR) and is payable in USD in cash only. Conversion into USD is made based on the exchange rate at the time of application.
